However, the work doesn't stop there. We hold ambitious plans to build on this solid platform to develop two new festivals and broaden our community engagement activities in pursuit of *Art Beyond Boundaries* - our artistic vision for 2025-28.

VISION

Birnam Arts at the heart of the community

Birnam Arts is a multi-purpose arts, community and conference venue in the twin villages of Dunkeld & Birnam, Highland Perthshire. Originally founded by a group of local residents as 'The Birnam Institute', it has operated continuously since the building opened in 1883, adding a modern extension in 2001 and changing its name to Birnam Arts in 2011.

The community feels a strong sense of ownership over Birnam Arts and it is a lively gathering place and focal point for local people.

Our venue comprises of a 200-seater (400 standing) auditorium with hybrid tech to allow for live streaming of performances and events, 2 mezzanine level art gallery spaces, a visual arts studio with kiln and a performing arts/dance studio.

It also has an office, a meeting room, a permanent Beatrix Potter exhibition, a gift shop, a community kitchen, a 60-seat cafe, a community education office and a library.



AUDIENCE DEMOGRAPHICS

We estimate that **85,000** people - audiences, participants and visitors, came through the doors between April 2023 - March 2024.

11,900 visitors came from outside Perthshire, adding a potential spend of nearly £500,000 into the local economy.



21% of audience members and participants were under 18, and research shows that there is a demonstrable correlation between schoolchildren's grades in maths and literacy, and their involvement with drama or music activities - called the 'Mozart effect'.

ENGAGING WITH OUR COMMUNITY

We carefully programmed to accommodate all our community. For adults, we offered regular daytime creative and wellbeing sessions as well as evening and weekend classes and events.


We ran specialist projects such as Free Film Fridays and Autumn Voices for older people and hosted Just Singin, a community choir open to everyone, and accessible to people with dementia.

We offered after-school and holiday activities for children and daytime sessions for preschoolers. Term-time blocks of sessions as well as one-off activities were available. We worked closely with the local primary school and families to deliver activities they suggested.

We are particularly proud of the opportunities offered by our ballet school. We offered after-school and holiday activities for children and young people, as well as daytime sessions for pre-schoolers.

INCOME SOURCES

we continued As recover from the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic and dealt with the cost of living crisis and rising energy costs, 2023-24 was another financially challenging year for Birnam Arts. We had to make significant inroads into our reserves to be able continue to operating and serving our local community.



USERS OF OUR SPACES

We offer bright, welcoming spaces which are booked by a variety of non-profit and private organisations when we are not using the spaces for our own, or community, activities. We provide technical support and catering for conferences, weddings and private hires such as birthday parties. Our offer is unique in the local area and we attract customers from far and wide.

Corporate organisations who used our meeting and conferences spaces included Forestry Policy Group, Scottish Venison, Mountaineering Scotland, Jacobs, Atholl Estates, Nature Scotland and Scottish Forestry, Crown Estate Scotland and The Arts Society. We also hosted two ceilidhs, one wedding and many celebration parties!

Community organisations included Dunkeld and Birnam Climate Cafe, PH8 Community Trust, Traditional Arts & Culture Scotland,, First Responders, Horticultural Society, A9 Community Group, SWRI, Dunkeld and Birnam Repair Cafe, Bridge Club, Dunkeld and Birnam Angling Club, Young Farmers and Dunkeld and Birnam Junctions Action Group.

23,812 audience members attended events and performances and 831 members of the community took part in workshops and classes – with all the attendant benefits to their health and wellbeing from participating in arts and other community activities.

BEATRIX POTTER EXHIBITION

Our interactive Beatrix Potter exhibition is on the ground floor of our building and is well-loved by families. The exhibition contains replica letters, artefacts and drawings relating to Beatrix Potter, as well as children's play zones such as a Victorian school room and market stall.

Approximately 5,550 people attended the Beatrix Potter exhibition this year.



GIFT SHOP AND CAFE

Our gift shop sells a range of Potter-inspired gifts, as well as providing a platform for Perthshire-based artists and makers to sell their work, including Scents of the Wild, Ben & Lilly Creations and Fern River Jewellery.

In our cafe, we seek to source ingredients that include Scottish grown and harvested produce wherever possible. We work with local producers including the Taybank Growers Coop, Stewart Tower Dairy and ARAN Bakery. The Field community growing project also sell their seasonal fresh produce at Birnam Arts.

The gift shop and café sourced products from 20 local suppliers and makers to a value of £28,200

CASE STUDY: JESSICA RAMM

Artist in Residence July - Sept 2023

For our July 2023 artist in residence, (AiR), call out, we targeted artists having to balance their care responsibilities with their practice. Everyone who applied fitted the requirement – 16 people applied who are caring for partners, parents or young children.

We chose Jessica Ramm (fine performance. sculpture, multimedia) because of her strong application, her work being risk taking, high end, with a strong sense of excellence and who is rapidly becoming acclaimed. Throughout the residency, Jessica explored working rocks, considering local with implication of time, vibration and layers of experience. Her proposal was in tune with our environment curatorial line, engaging with the local landscape.

Jessica lives locally (within 20 miles of Birnam) and was a new mum with an 8-month old baby (at time of application). She was breastfeeding so we bought a fridge to enable her to express and store her breastmilk, following Scottish Government guidelines on how to support a breastfeeding mother.

Although there is no expectation of a finished outcome for our AiR opportunities, Jessica carried out research and development work for the sonic art piece which enabled her to create a finished piece which she presented at Dusk Art Festival, 18-21 June 2023 in Lisbon. Jessica expressed interest in bringing the 'rock concert' to Birnam – and accepted a solo exhibition at BA from 27 April - 2 June 2024, where she performed a site specific scratch 'rock concert'.

The main challenge of this AiR was for Jessica to carve out the time to come to do her work at BA, due to her caring responsibilities. We offered her 10 days use of the studio, but she could only manage 8 days. This was not a problem though, as both sides were happy with how the residency went.

We discovered that there is strong demand for AiR opportunities. The format and support we gave was just right and we will use this model again.

We aim to develop our next opportunity - AiR#3 - to increase accessibility for visual and applied artists based in Scotland with protected characteristics.

This project will provide access to a dedicated artistic space outside of working hours, recognising the challenges of balancing paid work and/or family/caring responsibilities whilst developing a growing artistic practice.

SUPPORTING COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Birnam Arts is home to several local community groups and festivals which are supported by us through reduced studio, auditorium and meeting room rates (our subsidised community booking rate), marketing promotion including poster design and distribution, social media across multiple channels, in print and on our website, staffing, box office and wider promotion (for festivals).

Our community hire rate is available when a class or group is a not-for-profit organisation or if the class is for wellbeing activities, is made affordable to participants, and is open to everyone.

This year, we hosted more than 18 community activities, including:

- Birnam Institute Players local amateur dramatic society
- Just Singin' Community Choir

- Blow & Blast woodwind ensemble sessions
- Creative Kids programme of weekly visual arts workshops
- Pottery Classes with Kiln Creative
- Pete Clark Fiddle Masterclasses week-long music courses in Scottish fiddle tuition held twice a year, which attracts international students
- Neil Gow Festival (March '23) Celebration of the 18th-century local fiddler and composer through workshops, classes and concerts.
- Scottish Community Amateur Drama Festival and Scottish Youth Community Amateur Drama Festival
- Dunkeld and Birnam Repair Cafe
- Wellbeing and learning activities included Thai Chi, Pilates, French Conversation Cafe, Bridge Club and Tiny Tunes (pre-school singing sessions)
- Birnam Book Festival (Oct '23) A collaboration between Birnam Arts and the Birnam Reader Bookshop, showcasing literature from Scotland and beyond (cancelled this year due to storms.)



WIDER COMMUNITY IMPACT

During 2023-24, we employed **5 full time and 13 part time staff**, drawn from local residents as well as throughout Highland Perthshire, including 4 young people from 4 different Perthshire schools.

30 people volunteered their time, skills and energy in areas such as front of house, working in the shop and assisting families attending the Beatrix Potter exhibition.

Our Board of eight trustees also give their time voluntarily and continue to play a key role in overseeing our effective governance and financial accountability.

Political parties use our venue to connect to the communities they serve through surgery days. In July 2023, we hosted Humza Yousaf (pictured), then First Minister of Scotland. 38 members of the local community volunteered with us, which amongst other individual and societal benefits, helps to build a more resilient local community.





CASE STUDY: RUARAIDH MACPHEE

Ruaraidh (22), from Dunkeld, studied Higher Music Tech and Advanced Higher Music at Breadalbane Academy and always had a passion for the arts. Ruaraidh started his career, however, working as a butcher in his final 2 years of school and during the pandemic.

Deciding he needed a change, he started working as a Front of House Assistant at Birnam Arts in June 2021. A year later, responding to a staff shortage, the enterprising young man started assisting with touring shows in the venue, doing set ups, helping musicians with get-ins, stage lighting, basic sound and assisting at conferences. Ruaraidh officially became Operations and Technical Support Officer at the end of 2022.

"I love the diversity of the role. My favourite moments are doing gigs for bands like Talisk and Tidelines - bands I've grown up listening to.

If I hadn't got this job, I would have had to move to a bigger city to pursue better opportunities. Due to the connections I've made and the skills I've learnt at BA, I've been able to secure a part-time job as Venues Technician at Perth Theatre and Concert Hall and now work between the two venues"

His job at BA also introduced Ruaraidh to the local drama group BIPS and he has since taken on many roles - including working backstage, playing the drumkit in the band and playing Bottom in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.

"It's a great place to work, it's taught me a lot. Anyone can benefit massively from working here."



CASE STUDY: DUNKELD AND BIRNAM TRADITIONAL YOUTH MUSIC GROUP


Believing in the power of music education to transform lives, in October 2022, local musicians and educators Karys Watt and Gill Hunter ran traditional Scottish fiddle and accordion taster workshops in schools in Blairgowrie, Aberfeldy and Pitlochry, followed by 2 taster weekends at Birnam Arts.

Gaining lots of interest, they secured funding to run free term-time weekly music tuition from Spring 2023.

The project runs weekly during term time and is open to those aged P5 – S6 . The project currently has 34 members - 20 children join the tuition groups and 25 take part in the Junior and Senior bands.

CASE STUDY: BIRNAM ARTS BALLET SCHOOL

Birnam Arts Ballet School was formed in 2003 as a response to requests from the local community for children's ballet lessons to be included in the programme at the newly built Birnam Arts centre.

The School aims to build confidence, develop fitness and performance skills and encourage interest in dance and offers the chance to make new friends and connect communities.

71 children and 31 adults are currently enrolled and attend classes on Monday - Thursday evenings.


Royal Academy of Dance examination sessions are held annually and regular performances featuring all dancers continue to be enjoyed by the local community.

"As somebody who didn't always enjoy my school life and did not see much of a future for myself academically, I don't think I would be in college following my passion without Birnam Arts.

The classes of ballet were the highlight of my day and often an escape from my school life. They helped build my confidence in performance and socially and they helped me in many other ways."

COMMUNITY FEEDBACK

53 participants from Just Singin', Creative Writing and Adult Ballet groups were asked how they felt about taking part in these groups.

70% felt the group benefited their wellbeing

50% saw it as a place to exchange knowledge and skills

42% experienced increased confidence and self-esteem

90% said it made them feel happy to be involved

87% said it gave them a sense of achievement

60% said their class was the social highlight of their week

95% said they would continue to take part
